The Initiative

The Ford Foundation and partners have invested funds through the Urban Institute for selected states to implement more *effective*, *streamlined*, and *integrated* approaches to delivering key supports for low-income working families.





The Planning Year

States will be given the opportunity to design and test strategies to improve the delivery of work supports to low-income families during the first year.

Some states may receive funding to implement these strategies for up to 3 years following the planning year.
