

Training


- Educate providers on how to identify elder mistreatment through screening

Mental Health Services Program

Importance

- Following abuse, an older adult may develop:
 - Depression
 - PTSD
 - Anxiety
- Risk of alcohol, drug, and tobacco use increases
- Increased risk of hospitalization and premature death

Delivery
 Patient receives one hour counseling sessions weekly with Therapist
 Delivered through <i>Vidyo</i> video-conference program HIPAA compliant

 Accessed through iPad provided by program

 Any technical issues solved by Treatment Coordinator

Measurements	&
Goals	

- Patient symptoms are evaluated for significant signs of depression, PTSD, and anxiety.
- The major goals for ٠ treatment are established between the therapist and the patient, but mainly focus on restoring a sense of safety and pre-trauma functioning.



Social Isolation in Older Adults

- Factors leading to isolation:
 - Living in rural or isolated areas
 - Changes to family and friend connections
 - Loss of ability (driving, limited mobility, etc)
 - Shifts in roles (retirement, caregiver vs receiving care)
 - Concerns of being a "burden"
 - Lack of reciprocity from family/friends
- Increases risk for:
 - Abuse and exploitation
 - Negative mental health outcomes
 - Cognitive decline and dementia
 - Negative health outcomes

- Strategies to increase connection:
 - Senior centers
 - Religious groups
 - Local social groups (rotary, library, AARP, etc)
 - Neighbors and community activities
 - Local AAA
 - Volunteering
 - Attempt to reconnect with family & friends


